There was sunshine throughout our four divisions this afternoon, although the wet weather did put pay to a handful of games.

In the Pitching In Southern League Premier South, leaders, Merthyr Town, hit another five goals, this time past Bracknell Town, in a 5-1 win. It means they now have 85 from 32 League games.

Just behind them, AFC Totton were held to a 1-1 draw at Swindon Supermarine, whilst Gloucester City won at Poole Town courtesy of a stoppage time goal. Walton & Hersham beat Tiverton Town 3-0 to leapfrog Dorchester Town who were held to a 1-1 draw by neighbours, Wimborne Town.

Over in the Pitching In Southern League Premier Central, Bedford Town remain top following a 3-1 Friday night triumph over Kettering Town in front of a crowd of almost 2,000. Talking of crowds, there were over 3,000 at Halesowen Town to see them recover from going a goal down early on to beat local rivals, Stourbridge 3-1. AFC Telford United overcome the challenge of in-form Leiston as Stratford Town left it late to salvage a point at Bishop's Stortford.

With leaders, Yate Town, not in action until Monday evening, Exmouth Town missed the chance to close the gap in the Pitching In Southern League Division One South as they lost 2-1 at in-form Malvern Town, who remain just outside the top five.

It meant that Evesham United went back second as they returned to winning ways in emphatic fashion by beating Larkhall Athletic 5-0. Mousehole enjoyed a good 2-0 triumph at Bristol Manor Farm, whilst fifth-placed Bishops Cleeve trounced a young Helston Athletic by nine goals to nil.

There was a much-needed 4-I victory for Melksham Town against Bemerton Heath Harlequins as both teams sit just outside the top five.

In the Pitching In Southern League Division One Central, leaders, Real Bedford, had a good 4-0 triumph at an in-form Biggleswade FC, a result which took them to the 70-point mark. Just behind them, Berkhamsted were pushed all the way by Enfield but they ended up 2-1 victors.

Third-placed Barton Rovers had to settle for a share of the spoils in a home goalless draw with Beaconsfield Town.

Basingstoke Town 0 Havant & Waterlooville 3

The visitors grabbed an early lead when Ryan Seager added to his impressive tally. NEWS ROUND-UP

WIMBORNE TOWN | HOLMES IS WHERE THE HEART IS

When the opportunity to return to former club, Wimborne Town, came up in December, Toby Holmes grabbed it with both hands.

The experienced goal-getter is back on a mission to ensure that the Dorset club can maintain the Pitching In Southern League Premier South status that they worked so hard to achieve following promotion at the end of last term.

Holmes saw his second spell at Poole Town, for whom he made a total of 129 appearances, come to a rather unexpected end and on Tuesday evening he came up against his former club, helping Wimborne secure a big three points courtesy of a 1-0 win in front of a crowd of over 2,000.

"To see so many people at Tuesday's game was brilliant," he told us. "You don't get the opportunity to play in front of a crowd like that too often at this level. "Fair play to both sets of fans who turned out in great numbers for a Tuesday evening game and created a

fantastic atmosphere under the lights.

"On these occasions you just have to enjoy it and make sure you're not on the losing side! I got some stick from the Poole fans; as a former player you expect that, it's all part-and-parcel of the game. I gave a bit back at the end, though!

"The victory meant that we took four points from two really tough home games this week having followed up our draw with leaders, Merthyr Town. These results have given us a real lift as a group.

"Since my return in December we've been in almost every game we've played, there have only been a couple of games where we've come up short and you can tell that the momentum is building as we head into the 'business end' of the season.

"It's so important because you only have to look at the table to see how tight it is. If we can string a few results together than is relieves the pressure slightly. We're by no means out of the woods yet, but what these last two results do is give us a platform to build on.

"The performance against Merthyr Town was a real team effort with everyone giving 110%. The fact that we came off the pitch disappointed not to have won is testament to the way we played.

"We took the confidence from that into the Poole game but being a local derby and with so much on it, it was a rather cagey match. The pitch made it difficult to get the ball down and play and our opponents were hard to break down, but we stuck to our task to get our reward late on.

"It was a scrappy goal, but they all count and we deserved the win in the end. Now we have to ensure that we take this fighting spirit into the battles that lie ahead between now and the end of the season.

"This time of the season is always the most exciting part. Almost anything can still happen at both ends of the table and with things being so tight, it just adds pressure to every game.

"Experience tells me that we just have to concentrate on what we do and ensure we do our bit and then see what else happens around us.

"Anyone can beat anyone on the day, much the same as last season. As it stands we are the highest placed of the promoted teams from last season; the aim was always to consolidate at this level with a view to taking the next step the following season.

"We're on course to do that but there is still a lot of football to be played and there will be many twists and turns along the way for all teams."

BEMERTON HEATH HARLEQUINS | PLATT'S MAGIC

The script could not have been written any better for Luke Platt's first home game since his appointment as permanent manager of Bemerton Heath Harlequins.

A resounding 7-0 home success over Bristol Manor Farm not only extended the Wiltshire outfit's unbeaten League run to six games, but also thrust them headlong into the Pitching In Southern League Division One South play-off places.

"This was a fantastic way to make a statement," Platt told us. "We've got a great group here; each and every one of them played their part in this tremendous victory.

"I've been at the club for five weeks now and I'm excited by what the future holds in store for us.

"We're all on the same page in terms of where we want to be come the end of the season and the players are embracing every opportunity that comes their way, which is so refreshing to see. "This League is tough for many different reasons. Every team we have played since I have been here have brought their own challenges in some regard. There's a variety of styles and threats which, as a coach, makes it a great test.

"There are also some long trips too which bring their own challenges. We played three away fixtures in seven days and this led to 650 miles of travel, something that can take its toll on the players over such a short period of time.

"But the lads are giving me everything they've got and to see us in such free-flow at the weekend, really was a sight to behold.

"We won't get too carried away, of course. Yes, it's nice to win 7-0, particularly against one of the fancied teams, but we have to keep doing the right things and adding to the momentum we

"Short-term we'll take each game as it comes and focus on that solely. As I say, every game is different so we have to prepare for what's to come and how we set up against that will always be important.

"If we get that right, our long-term goal of reaching the play-offs can be achieved, but we have to focus on being consistent in our approach.

"Things can change quickly in football, so having a group of players who are all pulling in the same direction to achieve the same goal will be key."

As well as taking on key managerial and coaching roles at the likes of Poole Town, Brockenhurst and Shaftesbury, Platt has also gained experience in the highest levels of the game with AFC Bournemouth, Southampton, Yeovil Town and Rangers, where he was involved in tactical analysis, player development and talent identification.

As such, he is a firm believer in being able to nurture young talent within a dynamic and well-structured team environment.

"I'm really big on playing a certain way in football," he added. "I know we hear it a lot but I'm constantly telling the group how important it is to me to have people talk about our brand of football in a positive manner and the importance of performance over results.

"Some people won't agree with that, but it's a big part of my make-up as a coach and as a manager, which probably comes from working with the likes of Stephen Purches at AFC Bournemouth, who has massively influenced my career from an early stage in the game. "I've been very lucky to be around people like him and Eddie Howe in small moments and I'd

"I've been very lucky to be around people like him and Eddie Howe in small moments and I'd also say Pep Lijnders and Jurgen Klopp's style during the 2019/20 season played a big part in how I want to be able to influence the game.

"I want my teams to play with intensity and intelligence, whilst maintaining high standards in everything we do, on and off the pitch.

"This is a fantastic opportunity for me at a club whose ambitions match my own. The desire to progress and improve was simply enough for me to know that this is the right place to be. "I have worked with a few lads here previously at other clubs and the positivity from them in the conversations I had only backed up and strengthened what I was thinking. The way they spoke about the club was a big factor and it's great to see the rest of the lads already buying in to what we want to do here.

"It's a journey that I am really looking forward to." Platt took his side to Melksham Town earlier today.

REAL BEDFORD | CLICKING INTO PLACE

Drew Richardson is enjoying what he describes as his best season in non-League football as part of Real Bedford's challenge for the Pitching In Southern League Division One Central title. "I feel really comfortable in the position I'm playing and the role that I have been asked to fulfil tis season," he told us. "The way the team plays suits my style perfectly and the philosophy of the Gaffer matches my own.

"Everything has clicked into place and it's probably the best season I've had in non-League. "We're doing really well. Going into the season with the team that the Gaffer had assembled, we knew that we would be in and around the top and here we are in the middle of February don't exactly that!

"It's big credit to the Gaffer and his coaching style. We're very much looking forward to what the business end of the season holds in store, this is why you play football.

"No-one wants to go into this stage of the season with nothing to play for, so we're excited by what these weeks ahead hold in store for us. "I've played and won at this level previously during my time at Bedford Town, so I know what it's all about and what it takes to be successful. "This past experience certainly helped me and the team going into the new season following promotion. The quality of this level is improving all of the time and we've embraced the challenge that has been put in front of us.

"The aim is promotion, whether that's automatically or through the play-offs, and with the quality that we have here it will hopefully give us the edge in what is an extremely competitive League."

There was a rare appearance on the scoresheet for Richardson last weekend as he notched the first goal in a 3-1 victory over Enfield, their 21st win in 27 League outings.

"It's always nice to see one hit the back of the net, especially when it doesn't happen very often," the former Luton Town youngster said with a smile. "As a team I feel we played well on Saturday considering the pitch and weather conditions, but we knew this going into the game and stuck to our normal way of playing as much as possible.

"It was a deserved three points but fair play to Enfield because they didn't stop running all game and made life tough for us.

"I'm really enjoying my football right now and I just want to stay fit and healthy for the remainder of the season to help the team achieve the goal that we set out for back in the summer. "Maybe I'll be able to add one or two more goals along the way too?!"

A trip to neighbours, Biggleswade FC, was on the agenda earlier today.

HALESOWEN TOWN | MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Jak Hickman is fully invested in his local community.

Having spent eight years within the youth ranks at West Bromwich Albion, the 26 year-old has gone on to enjoy a senior career that has included appearances for Bolton Wanderers and led to him establishing himself as a key member of his hometown team, Halesowen Town, as they push for promotion from the Pitching In Southern League Premier Central.

Off the pitch, he is owner of the Dudley and Halesowen branch of Kixx Football Academy, which caters for youngsters who are taking their first steps into the game from the age of two up to ten.



For Hickman it's more than just a business, it's a mission.

"I have a passion for helping children reach their potential and a real interest in making a positive contribution to my local community," he told us. "I want to make an impact; I want to instil confidence in every child that walks onto the pitch here.

"We're in it for the long haul, some children progress quickly whilst others may take a little longer. If I can pass on some of the knowledge and experience that I have gained to help local kids make their way in the game, then I will be happy."

Some of the youngsters that come under the wing of Hickman and his team of coaches are fans of the Yeltz and take great pride in cheering him from the sidelines on a Saturday afternoon.

There are also some who follow the fortunes of local rivals, Stourbridge, and this weekend both clubs go head-to-head in the latest 'Number 9 derby', so-called because of the bus route that links the two Black Country towns.

"It's a game that everyone is looking forward to," said Hickman, who had a spell at the Glassboys during the 2021/22 season. "I've played in a few of these now so I understand the hype around the game and how much it means to people locally. "I've got kids in my academy that follow both clubs, so that rivalry is always there, particularly this season as both clubs are battling it out at the top end of the table. "The League this season is crazy. There's only 12 points that separate the whole top half and the lead has changed hands so many times!

"For the neutral it's exciting, it can be frustrating when you're involved in the thick of it and we've just got to make sure we can show the consistency which will see us finish right up there. All we can do is take care of our own business.

"I'm enjoying being involved. I've kept myself fit for the majority of the season and feel that I have put in a consistent level of performance. We've been able to put ourselves into a strong position and now we're just excited for the run-in.

"As a local lad I want to play my part in bringing the good times to the club. My role on and off the pitch has to step up a level over the weeks ahead to ensure that we can get to where we want to be.

"We understand that now it's time to get down to business and we can't afford to take our foot off the gas at any point. We're going to be fighting hard to achieve something come the end of the season and give our fantastic fans something to really shout about.

"The numbers that we get are superb and they made a big difference to us." Making a difference is something that Hickman is keen to do and he's also a big supporter of the work that Haleowen Town do for men's mental health, alongside Andy's Man Club.

The Grove is home to the first Andy's Man Club to be held in the West Midlands, with sessions taking place between 7pm and 9pm each Monday evening in the Yeltz Bar. Andy's Man Club is a free peer-to-peer group that provides a place for men to come together in a safe and open environment to talk about the issues or problems that they have faced or are currently facing.

"The club is doing brilliant things this season to support and bring awareness to men's mental health," Hickman added. "It's something that we are really supportive of and want to showcase as much as possible."
