COMEBACK KINGS



The Pitching In Southern League Premier South sees Walton & Hersham on top after they battled out a 2-1 victory away at Plymouth Parkway.

It was their fifth win from six League games as they leapfrogged AFC Totton who played out an entertaining 2-2 draw with Basingstoke Town, a result which leaves both clubs' unbeaten League records intact.

There were commanding home victories for Dorchester Town, Gosport Borough and Merthyr Town, but it was a particularly good day for Swindon Supermarine who hit five without reply against Poole Town, whilst Conor Lee (pictured) was the star for Chertsey Town as his hattrick saw them come back from three goals down to draw 3-3 with Winchester City.

Over in the Pitching In Southern League Premier Central, the top five now all sit on 13 points after Stamford lost 1-0 at Banbury United following a late goal for the hosts.

Redditch United came from behind to win at Harborough Town, whilst AFC Telford United made the long trip to Lowestoft Town and came home 2-1 victors.

AFC Sudbury enjoyed a good 3-0 away win at Spalding United, whilst both Bromsgrove Sporting and Alvechurch also brought home three points from their travels at Biggleswade Town and Hitchin Town respectively.

There was also Isuzu FA Trophy first round qualifying action this afternoon.

Notable results include Yate Town winning 5-0 away at Bemerton Heath Harlequins, Flackwell Heath getting a 2-1 triumph at Farnham Town, Leverstock Green beating Bury Town and Real Bedford getting a 2-1 win at Walthamstow.

AFC Totton 2 Basingstoke Town 2

It was lucky seven for Charlie Austin as that's how long it took for him to open the scoring for the home side in the seventh minute.

The evergreen Scott Rendell had doubled the lead within three minutes later, but within a minute of that, Liam Ferdinand had reduced the arrears as this game burst to life.

The scores were levelled at 2-2 on 18 minutes when Ferdinand slotted home his second and that is how it remained.

Bracknell Town | Havant & Waterlooville |

It's been quite a week of change for the home club and it looked like it would end on a losing note when a late goal from Ryan Seager gave the visitors the lead. But the home side showed their resolve and were able to grab a point as Ethan Burden scored a stoppage time leveller.

Chertsey Town 3 Winchester City 3

The visitors were able to get their noses in front in the opening exchanges as Tom Wright found the net.

The day got better for the visitors when Daniel Jones was able to extend their lead midway through the first half and then on the half-hour mark, Oliver Balmer made it three.

LOUD AND **PROUD**

No-one expected Real Bedford to come quietly into the Pitching In Southern League.

They are a club that don't care what others think; they have their own style and swagger, which has seen them win four of their five Division One Central games so far, scoring 17 goals in the process. Chalking up the biggest victory of the season so far across all four of our divisions - an 8-0 romp against North Leigh - their backstory is one that has fascinated many.

In the wake of relegation from the Spartan South Midlands League Premier Division in 2022, Bitcoin Podcaster, Peter McCormack, took over as Chairman promising to take the club on a journey and just two years down the line, he has certainly delivered. Step 4 football and big American investment earlier this year mean that this is just the start of the story.

"I had always wondered why Bedford never had a team in The Football League and why Bedford Town had never managed to reach that level," McCormack told us. "Growing up as a Liverpool supporter, I eventually felt the pull to support a local team. I started attending Bedford Town matches and quickly realised that football success is rooted in the business side of the sport. "For a club to succeed, it must be a sound business that can compete for top players and managers. I saw opportunities for Bedford Town to grow both internationally, and commercially at a local level. I approached the club with a proposal, but when my initial offer was turned down, I turned to their neighbors, Bedford FC, made an offer, and took control of the club."

The club changed its name to Real Bedford ahead of the 2022/23 season. McCormack's

first major mark, and it led to a double of promotion and the Bedfordshire Senior Trophy.

"At Real Bedford Football Club, we have a relentless desire to win, but we wish to do so by playing attractive and entertaining football," continued McCormack. "Winning matches is important to us, but we believe a football club should be more than just a sports team; it should be a voice for its community, creating positive change off the pitch.

"We have five pillars:

- 1. Opportunity: We are committed to fostering skill development for boys and girls of all ages, rejecting equality of outcome in favor of building strong, resilient young people who value discipline, hard work, and fairness.
- 2. Fairness: Real Bedford champions economic fairness and supports those combating corruption and authoritarianism. We are dedicated to promoting human rights and liberty for all.
- 3. Advocacy: We promote free speech and oppose excessive taxation and government interference. We advocate for smaller government, lower taxes, and fostering entrepreneurship and free markets.
- 4. Bitcoin: This is central to our identity and financial strategy. With its fixed supply, Bitcoin protects against inflation and preserves wealth. As a decentralised peer-to-peer network, it resists censorship and protects privacy, a cornerstone of democracy. It is also a tool for activists fighting dictatorships worldwide.

5. Ethics: We oppose the ownership of football clubs by regimes with egregious human rights records. Premier League club owners should pass a fit and proper person test.

"Real Bedford Football Club believes that the goals and interests of football clubs should never come before human rights, the fight against corruption, and the prevention of government overreach. We are committed to making these values integral to our club's identity.

"I couldn't be happier with where we're at as a club; the progress has been unreal — back-to-back promotions for the men, now playing at Step 4, and a treble for our women's team in their inaugural season. "Off the pitch, I'd like to be further ahead, but building the right infrastructure takes time. I'm also quickly learning how fast things can change and am having to adapt to the higher leagues and the challenges that come with them.

"I'm loving these early days in the Southern League. Five games in, and we're sitting just off top spot with four wins, but I'm aware there are other strong clubs; Aylesbury United, Berkhamsted and Flackwell Heath have had great starts. If we're still up there challenging at the end of the season, I'll be a happy chairman.

"I expect things to be much more challenging, both on and off the pitch, at this level. We are now starting to face bigger clubs with long histories, clubs that are well accustomed to this level. Our manager [Rob Sinclair] is one of the best in non-League football, with a proven track record, and I believe he has built a squad capable of competing. Off the pitch, there is far more administration, which we are gradually getting used to. I am fortunate to have such a great team around me." We asked McCormack how the skills that he has learned and develop in business have transferred into running a football club. "I think my experience has been really beneficial," he added. "Knowing how to run a company, read a balance sheet, and understand a P&L statement helps with the challenges of running a football club, but my career in advertising and marketing has

probably been the most valuable.

"To sell merchandise, attract fans to games,

and secure sponsors, you need to get the brand and message out there, which is something I have focused on heavily. Football, however, is unique; in every other business, the aim is to grow sales and deliver a profit, but in football, we are simply trying to get as close to breaking even as possible. "There are definitely downsides, like the outdated misogynistic attitudes that persist towards the women's game, the bureaucracy of football administration, and operating within what is essentially a dictatorial monopoly, but overall, I really can't complain.

"Football brings out both the best and the worst in people. I've had to have a word with myself sometimes as the passion has got ahead of me. One specific game I was particularly rude to a referee, it was a reality check. I wrote to him and apologised and have tried to be more stoic since. Football is full of characters and I've met incredible individuals doing remarkable things in their communities, but I've also come across some real bad apples too."

So, what are the short and long-term ambitions for the club? "In the short term, our goal is to challenge for the league again with both our men's and women's sides" McCormack responded. "In the long term, we aim for the men's team to reach The Football League and, eventually, the Premier League, while the women's team targets the Women's Super League.

"Of course, I get laughed at for these ambitions, and understandably so, but we have won every league we've competed in as Real Bedford, and while it's still early in the season, both our teams are currently top of the league, so I hope we'll be in the mix by the end of it.

"As for the Premier League and WSL aspirations, we now have billionaire co-owners, Cameron and Tyler Winklevoss, who have made their first investment in the club - \$4.5 million - the largest ever investment in a non-League football club. They share my vision for Real Bedford and are ready to support it."

We were keen to find out the biggest influences on McCormack, in business, football and life.

"My biggest influence has always been punk rock," he said without hesitation. "I grew up on bands that couldn't give a **** about what society thinks, bands that stood fiercely for their values and called out the status quo without hesitation. I have no time for assumed authority or for people who tell us how things 'should' be done.

"At Real Bedford, we don't care what others think; we're here to do things our way. If that means standing up against what we disagree with, then so be it. This isn't arrogance as some might perceive it; it's about rejecting the herd mentality and challenging the complacency that has dragged society into decline.

"I have a particular disdain for the government and the media—both rife with liars and grifters, pitting people against each other, the latter, quietly looting the wealth of hardworking citizens with their moronic economic policies.

"I also make it a point to spread awareness about the dangers of socialism, which I know often comes from a place of good intentions but is rooted in a flawed framework that lacks a basic understanding of economics. In the end, it tends to worsen the very problems it claims to solve, stifling innovation, freedom, and individual responsibility in the process."

Life will certainly never be dull at Real Bedford. Today they take their place in the Isuzu FA Trophy for the first time with a first round qualifying tie at Walthamstow.

NEWS ROUND-UP

GOSPORT BOROUGH | MAKING THINGS HAPPEN

After falling at the play-off hurdle last season, Gosport Borough will be looking to kick-start their season this afternoon when they return to Pitching In Southern League Premier South action at home to Tiverton Town.

Just one win from their opening five League games has left them in the lower reaches of the embryonic League table, but summer signing, Asher Yearwood, isn't concerned as he knows that it's only a matter of time before things start to click into place.

The attacking midfielder shone in the Premier South for Beaconsfield Town last term and has already weighed in with three League goals this term, impressing many at the Hampshire club with his dynamic style.

"It was clear to see when I first arrived at the club how much the ending to last season hurt," he told us. "Right from the first day of preseason there was determination to put things right and that was reflected in what was a strong and enjoyable pre-season.

"Going into the season I felt in a really good place. The early results, for one reason or another, haven't quite gone the way we would have hoped, but some of the performances have been encouraging and the feeling is that we are warming up now.

"It's four unbeaten now in all competitions since the defeat at Hungerford Town as we look to get in amongst the leading pack, as we were for much of last season.

"Coming into the team since the summer, I have really enjoyed it. Working with Pat [Suraci] and Joe [Lea], I am learning all of the time and I feel that I have done okay, but my main focus is on helping the team win games.

"It's a strange League; everyone beats everyone and momentum is so important. It's an even stronger competition than last season, and with a few full-time teams in there too, there are a lot of clubs wanting promotion.

"I feel that it's always good to set targets at the beginning of each season and then assess them as you go along. I have a goals tally in mind and as a team we have targets in terms of points, but ultimately, it's about winning promotion, that's everyone's ambition."

Yearwood has certainly been a welcome addition to the team, impressing with his high energy and running both on and off the ball. "I just want to be involved with goals, be that scoring them or assisting," he concluded. "I love getting on the ball and trying to be exciting and make things happen."

On that score, it's definitely been a case of so far, so good.

STOURBRIDGE | BUS WORD

Having opened his scoring account for the season with a goal in Stourbridge's commanding 5-0 Emirates FA Cup victory over Dudley Town last weekend, Ethan Freemantle is hoping that more goals will now follow.

The former Kidderminster Harriers man returned to the Glassboys over the summer on a permanent basis having had a successful loan spell at the club last season.

"I am hoping it will be like buses," he told us. "You wait a while for one to arrive and then when it does, more follow close behind!

"It was nice to finally get off the mark; as a striker you are judged on goals and going into the season, I set myself a target of getting over 20, so we're up-and-running on that now.

"Despite so many new faces coming in over the summer, we've already started to show what we are capable of. It's a credit to the Gaffer and his management team that we have gelled so quickly.

"They have brought in lads who are all of the same mentality; extremely focused, hard-working and, ultimately, winners. They have been big on the team bonding sessions and it's already paying dividends with the way that we have hit the ground running this season.

"Even in the game that we lost at Stamford, we were the better side, and it's certainly been a case of so far, so good, but we know that we have a lot more to offer and we're looking forward to the journey that stands before us.

"I think before the season started, a few people questioned our credentials considering it was a totally new team with so many changes on and off the field and also over the past few seasons the club has found itself stuck in the middle of the table, but we've started well and it was nice to make progress in the FA Cup at the weekend too.

"The Premier Central is a good standard, it's a strong League and there are some big clubs involved and a lot of local derbies, which is great for the fans. There's nothing to scare us; as I say, Stamford are the early leaders but we had the better of our game there and were made to pay for not taking our chances.

"As a team we're taking things one game at a time. There are a lot of positive things happening at the club and the bond that exists between the fans and the players is going to be so important as we move on through the season.

"The supporters here are fantastic and turn up in such good numbers. For our

recent game at Redditch United, they really were our 12th man and got us over the line. I couldn't believe the noise that they made! They have such passion and I can't wait to see the War Memorial Ground rocking in the same way!"

The Glassboys were held to a goalless draw on Friday evening by Barwell in front of a crowd of 950.

NEWS ROUND-UP

WESTBURY UNITED | HOT CROSS FUN

It was one of the results of the Emirates FA Cup first round qualifying as Westbury United of the Pitching In Southern League Division One South beat Premier South high-flyers, AFC Totton 3-1.

Bevan Cross set them on their way with the opening goal right on the stroke of half-time and there was no looking back as they ran out worthy winners following a determined second half display which summed up exactly what the FA Cup is all about.

"It was the perfect team performance," Cross told us. "We knew that we had to be excellent defensively, which we were, and then we'd have to take what few chances came our way, which we managed to do.

"We scored three really good goals and defended resolutely to secure a deserved win, something that we will remember for a long time.

"There was no secret to our success here, it was simply a case of everyone doing their job and working their socks off. After a disappointing 3-2 loss at Larkhall Athletic in the League on the previous Wednesday, it gave us extra motivation to get a result here.

"It's the first time that the club has reached this stage of the competition in over 20 years, so to be part of that is incredible, everyone is absolutely buzzing. Now the aim is to transfer this into our League performances and use the confidence to get us moving up the table.

"The goal was my first of the season; it's a bit disappointing that it's taken this long to arrive, but what a way to open my account!

"I know from last season how tough and unpredictable Division One South is, but we have showed here what are capable of. Last season was disappointing for the club, but we have strengthened the team and if we can get ourselves on a bit of a run of form, you never know what can happen.

"It would be nice if I can go on and get into double digits in terms of goals now, using this as motivation to really push

on. We have a couple of tough games coming up, at Bristol Manor Farm in the FA Trophy today and then away at Mousehole in the League, so that will be another test of our credentials."





WARE | FOUR-MIDABLE CLEMENTS

Scoring four goals in a 5-I away win at local rivals is a pretty special feat. That's exactly what Jon Clements did on Bank Holiday Monday as Ware romped home at Hertford Town.

"It was a massive result for the club and fans," he told us. "It's always one of those games on the schedule that you look out for; the Gaffer lets us know in the week leading up to the game how much it means to him, the club, the locals and fans, so to come away with a significant win, three points and loads of goals for the fans to celebrate is brilliant!

"Naturally I was over the moon to be able to weigh in with four of the goals. The pick of the bunch was the first with my head. It was great play from Jonny [Allotey] who has been fantastic since he came to the club, he delivered the ball perfectly and it was a proper strikers' finish.

"It set the tone for the other goals that followed and whilst I will get the plaudits for scoring four times, every single player on our team, from back to front, was fantastic and played their part to make it a massive six-point weekend." Clements didn't quite beat his record goalscoring haul as a couple of seasons ago he hit all five in a 5-2 Southern League victory for Ware over FC Romania. "Unfortunately, I've not beaten my personal best, but a hat-trick plus one is a great day for any striker and one that I will remember for a long time, especially scoring in front of the travelling Ware fans and you'll see that in my celebrations!

"To be as clinical as we were in a local derby on Monday bodes well. The dressing room has seen a lot of changes over the past few months, but we've recruited some really hungry and talented individuals.

"We're still growing as a team, but overall a great group of lads, and pleasure to play with.

"I love this League and the new teams that have joined us over the summer. There are one or two whom I expect to be leading the charge, but there is an extremely tight pack behind them battling it out for the play-off places. "It's difficult to judge early on with so many teams beating one another but I know if we continue performing as we are, we'll be right in there amongst it all

"Making the play-offs is a minimum target for a club such as Ware who have been up there for the past three seasons and missed out so narrowly. This is engrained into the boys from the outset and if I can reach 25 League goals, that is always the target I set myself."
