WHERE'S MY TOWEL?

These are heady days for Helston Athletic. Sitting proudly on top of the Pitching In Southern League Division One South in what is their first-ever taste of Step 4 football, life is good for the Cornish club.

Director of Football, Steve Massey, has achieved much in the game. As a player he graced the likes of Stockport County, AFC Bournemouth, Peterborough United, Northampton Town, Hull City, Cambridge United and Wrexham, for whom he appeared and scored in the European Cup Winners' Cup competition, during a 15-year career as a professional.

He has also managed and coached at a number of clubs, including Truro City, where he had three separate spells at the helm, and Falmouth Town. These days, he clocks up the miles travelling to games to watch forthcoming opponents and potential signings in action.

He has a wealth of stories from his time in the game, alongside some strong opinions, all of which he has put into several books, including one on his fascinating life story. "Deciding to sit down and attempt to write my life story – both in and out of football – was not the result of a single 'light bulb' moment," he admitted to us. "In one sense, it had been a thought nagging away in the back of my mind for years. Several factors then brought this vague idea into sharper focus. I had a mild stroke in January 2021 and a health scare like that is a wake-up call.

"It made me think about my own mortality, about priorities and making sense of what had happened – for better and for worse – during the sixty-odd years I had been alive. "Writing my autobiography was a way to put my life in order. This undoubtedly was one of the reasons I decided to step away from the hot-seat of managing a non-League football club the following year..

You could say that these two events made it seem like the ideal moment to put pen to paper, or finger to keyboard.

"Nevertheless, the thought of sifting through the misty memory banks — childhood, professional football career, marriage, children, running businesses, divorce etc. — was a daunting prospect. Where would I start? I put a message out on social media along those lines; 'Would love to write a book about my career and life, but...'

"A football fan who follows me on Twitter – as it was called back in 2022 – replied, suggesting that I should get offline, pick up a pen and start at the beginning. 'Stop procrastinating!' Without realising it, he had hit the proverbial nail on the head. I'm very good at putting things off. Nor did I have the ability and discipline to write a book by myself. I lacked self-confidence when it came to both the writing process itself and the reliability of my memory, particularly since that stroke. I needed help if the autobiography was going to be anything more than a pipe dream.

"After exchanging a series of private messages, that football fan – Rodney Marshall – suggested we meet up and discuss writing the book together. I knew that he had watched me play during my 18 months at Northampton Town back in the early 1980s. However, I knew nothing else about him. Mildly concerned that he might be some sort of 'anorak' with old photos from my playing days on his bedroom walls, I googled him and found that he had written dozens of books on a wide range of topics. Maybe this could lead to a collaboration after all.

"We met up on a hot June weekend in a brand-new hotel in the centre of Milton Keynes. We sat on the top floor, the glass walls offering panoramic views of the park, canal and cityscape. Rodney had done his homework on my career, arrived with notes, a miniature tape recorder and suggested that we should record our first session. He even had a proposed title for the book, taken from an anecdote I told him over the phone about arriving in non-League football and — as a pampered ex-pro — expecting everything to be laid out in the dressing room for me.

"I was already impressed! I also liked his suggestion of how we could approach the project. He would ask me questions, and I could ramble on about my earliest memories. The following day he would go back to Suffolk, I would drive home to Cornwall, and wait to hear from him. If I liked the way he had assembled my memories into written form, we could continue the arrangement.

"I wasn't expecting to hear from him for a week or two. We had recorded six hours of memories and transcribing would be a long, laborious process. I had also gone off on tangents. Not surprisingly, I guess, when you consider that I had been mentally time travelling back to the 1960s! Less than 48 hours later, the opening two chapters 'dropped'. Somehow, he had turned my chaotic ramblings into polished prose. I was reading my own memories, the beginning of my life story, in what was still my 'voice', but Rodney had given it structure and order. I was incredibly excited.

"Over the next six months we met up every four weeks and continued the collaborative process. Always face-to-face, never remotely. Each time he arrived prepared; armed with statistics, firing difficult questions, even challenging some of the decisions I had made, professional and personal.

"After a couple of hours, I'd feel my head frazzling. It was mentally draining, and – at times – emotionally so when I recalled either people like my father who had passed away, or moments of personal elation or deflation.

Nevertheless, as the months passed, and the book was growing, it struck me that the process was incredibly therapeutic. It was as if my life had been jigsaw pieces stuck in a box and now we were piecing it together, forming a clear picture.

"We revisited a few of my old haunts, such as the County Ground Northampton, where the football pitch and the club's main stand that my family used to sit in have long since vanished; and the seafront at Bournemouth where we would be sent on punishing pre-season runs along the beach from one pier to the other. You could almost feel the past still lingering, like a friendly ghost.

"When you collaborate with someone closely on your life story, you develop a rapport, a mutual trust. By the time we completed the book, Rodney was often able to read my mind. We visited the leisure parks which I used to co-own with my ex-wife. On a hot summer's afternoon, we went to my lock-up in Torbay, like raiders of the lost ark, searching out old photos and souvenirs which could go into the limited first edition of the book.

"Once the edited text was complete, we discussed how to publish and market the book. Having found an efficient printing press company, decided on numbers for both hardback and paperback, we contacted some of my ex-clubs to organise book signing events. We also put together a 'main launch' in Truro, with two hundred people invited to share a wonderful evening of nostalgia, amidst glasses of fizz and Roy Keane style prawn sandwiches. Signing copies of the book at the Hall of Cornwall that evening brought home to me how far we had come in half a year. From a vague notion in the virtual world to a physical book in the real one.

"It was a truly wonderful collaboration with someone who was always checking facts, verifying my memories, nagging me about future meetings, etc., keeping the project on the move. Which is what I needed. It would not have materialised without Rodney's drive. That is why Where's My Towel? is my story, but our book."
